

Mrs. Raff named PA Teacher of the Year

Pequea 6th-grade teacher picked from 12 finalists

Pequea Elementary sixth-grade teacher Elizabeth Raff has been named the Pennsylvania Teacher of the Year for 2022.

Mrs. Raff, a teacher at Pequea since 2014, was selected from 12 finalists who participated in the Pennsylvania Teacher of

the Year Conference, held in Hershey on December 5.

“We are thrilled that she is being recognized for all of her hard work and dedication,” said Penn Manor superintendent Mike Lechliter. “Elizabeth’s classroom is a dynamic place for her students to learn and grow. She creates a space where students are encouraged to explore ideas in a supportive and respectful environment.”

As Teacher of the Year, Mrs. Raff will represent Pennsylvania teachers at the state level by speaking at conferences, leading workshops and professional development sessions and visiting school districts, colleges and universities across Pennsylvania. She also will be a candidate for the National Teacher of the Year Award.

Mrs. Raff was nominated for the state award by two previous Teacher of the Year nominees, Jeff Kuntz of Punxsutawney, and Maria Vita, a Penn Manor High School

psychology teacher who was a finalist for the 2019 award.

Mrs. Raff’s classroom is decorated in an Alice in Wonderland theme and features a large library with books in every genre, as well as a raised stage where students can present poetry, book reports and original music to the entire class.

She encourages movement among her students and leads them through physical exercises that help them understand parts of speech, literary conventions and other lessons.

School district adds girls’ wrestling program

Penn Manor has a new sport for girls this year – wrestling.

The Penn Manor school board approved the addition of a school-sponsored girls’ wrestling team in November for students in grades 7 through 12.

Penn Manor became only the second school district in Lancaster County and the 23rd in Pennsylvania to offer girls’ wrestling, although several other schools have more recently started programs.

Interest in the sport has been exceptional, according to head coach Jason Fellenbaum.

“When we petitioned for the creation of a girls’ wrestling team at Penn Manor, we honestly thought it would be a team of just two or three girls this first year. To have 10 girls on this team for the entire season is awesome,” Fellenbaum said.

“We plan to recruit and continue to get the word out during the off-season. Our goal is to have a team of 30 girls next season.”

Team member Samantha Shaw, a high school freshman, said

New superintendent to be named in April

The search for a new superintendent for Penn Manor School District has been under way since the beginning of the year.

Applications for the position were accepted until February 18, and initial interviews were scheduled for March 8 and 10. A second round of interviews with finalists was scheduled for March 22 and, if necessary, March 24.

The school board is expected to announce the candidate it has selected for the superintendent's job on April 4. The board will then formally approve a contract with the new superintendent, who will begin working no later than July 1.

Dr. Kreider stepped down in December and was replaced by the former assistant director of student support services, Dr. Peggy Anastasio, who has more than 20 years of experience in special education at Penn Manor.

Julie Yost, who joined the Penn Manor staff in 2000, has been named assistant director of student support services.

Dr. Anastasio had served under Kreider as assistant director since 2007. From 2002 to 2007, she was a learning support teacher at Manor Middle School. She also was a Penn Manor elementary teacher of the gifted in 2002.

Dr. Anastasio received her doctorate in educational leadership from Immaculata University in 2015 and her master's in leadership for teaching and learning from Millersville University in 2008.

She received her principal's

certification in supervision of special education in 2008 and her bachelor's degree in elementary and special education in 2001, both from Millersville University.

Julie Yost served as secondary special education consultant and K-12 special education coordinator at Penn Manor since 2020.

She previously was K-6 special education coordinator from 2015 to 2020. Julie began her career at Penn Manor in 2000 as a learning support teacher at Pequea Elementary School.

Julie received her special education supervisory certificate from Millersville University in 2017 and her principal certification and master's degree in educational leadership from Alvernia University in 2011.

She earned her bachelor's degree in special education and elementary education from Clarion University in 1997.

Message from the superintendent

Many in the Penn Manor community are aware that earlier this year, I announced my departure from Penn Manor School District, effective June 30, 2022. At the beginning of February, I was appointed the next superintendent of the Harwood Unified Union School District in central Vermont.

I have been truly blessed to be part of the Penn Manor community since 1997. Two of my three children were born here, and all three of them graduated from Penn Manor.

My decision to step down from this position was both personal and professional but can be summed up as an overall feeling that I have concluded my chapter in Penn Manor. When you look at many of the projects I'm currently engaged in, it felt like this timing was a logical conclusion for my superintendency.

I firmly believe that Penn Manor will now be best served by a new superintendent who is able to look at the needs of the school district with fresh eyes.

Since my appointment as superintendent in 2009, I have enjoyed leading a highly effective administrative team, an outstanding faculty, and a dedicated support staff in our efforts to make Penn Manor a premier school system recognized in Lancaster County and throughout Pennsylvania. While I am proud of many of our accomplishments, the following stand out:

- Improvements to academic achievement as evidenced by Penn Manor's inclusion since 2015 on lists such as U.S. News & World Report's Best High Schools edition, outstanding scores in the PA School Performance Profile and the Future Ready PA Index, and our first district school – Letort Elementary – recognized by the U.S. Department of Education as a National Blue Ribbon School in 2019.

- Development of instructional technology initiatives, including Open Campus PA, as well as a successful 1-to-1 laptop

program featuring Open Source software.

- Sound fiscal management. Penn Manor is ranked 413 out of 500 school districts for expenditures per student, while still performing within the top tier of districts in Pennsylvania.

- Renovations to Martic, Pequea, Conestoga, and Central Manor Elementary Schools; the new Hambright Elementary, which is Penn Manor's first "new" school since 1960; and, finally, the extensive rebuilding of Penn Manor High School.

- The first public school district to partner with the Samaritan Center to implement TeenHope, a depression/suicide prevention program for students.

Elementary, middle schools earn U.S. News honors

Named among the top schools in PA and county

Five Penn Manor schools have been ranked among the top 10 public schools in Lancaster County and among the top 25 percent of public schools in Pennsylvania by U.S. News and World Report.

Manor Middle School was ranked No. 3, and Marticville Middle was ranked No. 7 of the 22 public middle schools in Lancaster County, according to U.S. News, which released the rankings in October.

Manor was ranked 151st of the 939 Pennsylvania middle schools included in the report, and Marticville was ranked 235th.

In addition, three Penn Manor elementary schools ranked in the top 10 countywide in the U.S. News report.

Conestoga Elementary was ranked seventh, Central Manor was ranked ninth, and Letort was ranked 10th of the 71 public elementary schools in the report. Statewide, Conestoga was ranked 147th of 1,752 schools, Central Manor was ranked 223rd, and Letort was ranked 225th.

The other rankings for Penn Manor elementary schools are: Martic — 12th in Lancaster County, 256th in Pennsylvania; Eshleman — 13th and 261st; Pequea — 15th and 289th; and Hambright — 37th

U.S. News & World Report evaluated the schools based on students' math and reading proficiency and the schools' socioeconomic demographics.

U.S. News ranked the schools based on students' math and reading proficiency and each school's socioeconomic demographics. Any school scoring in the top 30 percent in each state is considered "high achieving."

The rankings are the latest accolades for Penn Manor, which has earned seven

straight Best High School awards from U.S. News. In 2021, Penn Manor High School was ranked No. 2 in Lancaster County and 71st out of 678 high schools in Pennsylvania.

Penn Manor superintendent Mike Leichliter said the school district has been able to maintain high academic standards despite recent challenges related to the pandemic.

"The core mission of Penn Manor is to provide an outstanding education for our students," he said. "While it has been necessary to focus on other areas beyond our control recently, our teachers remain committed to ensuring that our students leave our schools with the skills necessary to succeed."

FFA poultry team places among the top 10 in U.S.

The Manor FFA Poultry Evaluation Team earlier this school year placed in the top 10 nationally at the FFA National Convention.

The team of Lizzy Strickler, Jenna Smith, Carly Railing and Molly Gehr — all Penn Manor sophomores — earned a gold ranking and placed ninth out of 37 teams in the National Poultry Evaluation Career Development Event, held October 28 at the Indiana

State Fairgrounds.

Individually, Carly Railing and Jenna Smith earned gold rankings, and Carly placed 17th out of 148. Molly Gehr earned a silver medal.

During the competition, the students had to take a written test on poultry management, complete a team problem-solving activity on poultry nutrition and processing, evaluate live hens and broilers, grade eggs and

chicken carcasses based on USDA criteria, and identify retail poultry meat cuts.

Also at the national convention, 2020 Penn Manor graduate Darby Conrad

received the American Degree, the highest honor in FFA.

The Penn Manor **football team** went 5-5 record, its best in several years.

Winter sports teams also fared well.

The **girls' basketball team** earned its first Section 1 L-L League title since 1975 and was a semifinalist in the league tournament. Lily Sugra was named Section 1 MVP, and head coach Megan Collins was named Section 1 Coach of the Year.

The **girls' bowling team** earned the Eastern Pennsylvania Bowling title, and Corrinne Smith, Eva Brubaker, Lacey Slaymaker, Kala Wasche, Willow Hee and Hope Leaman qualified for the state tournament.

Boys' wrestling team member Travis Clawson was a state qualifier, and Penn Manor's newest team – **girls' wrestling** – quickly made a name for itself.

she was excited when she learned of the new program.

"I wanted to do wrestling when I was younger but my parents wouldn't let me join the boys' team, so I was happy they made a girls' team."

Maddie Wagner, a Penn Manor freshman, said her favorite moment of the season was "winning my first match and getting my hand raised."

What Anisa Orr, a Penn Manor sophomore, loves about the sport, she said, is "the satisfaction and adrenaline rush when you pin someone."

According to national statistics, girls who wrestle are not usually involved in other sports, so wrestling can give them a stronger connection to the school community.

Wrestling also provides a new opportunity for girls to earn scholarships to

post-secondary institutions, and wrestling ranks second among all sports for producing first-generation college students.

Participation in girls' wrestling programs has grown by 200 percent in recent years in Pennsylvania, and there's a movement under way to get the sport officially sanctioned by the Pennsylvania Interscholastic Athletic Association.

Penn Manor has competed this season with teams from McCaskey, Manheim Township, Gettysburg, Cumberland Valley, Governor Mifflin and other schools throughout Pennsylvania.

Every Penn Manor team member has won at least one match, and at a recent tournament hosted here, four Comets wrestlers placed first or second in their weight class.

"Overall, this season has exceeded expectations," Fellenbaum said.

Commencement to be held outdoors for Class of 2022

Penn Manor High School's commencement will be held outdoors for the second year in a row.

The graduation ceremony for the Class of 2022 is scheduled for the evening of Wednesday, June 1, 2022, in Millersville University's Biemsderfer Stadium.

Former student builds pergola at Conestoga

Eagle Scout project, completed in fall, creates a year-round gathering space

Anders Nordstrom was considering ideas for his Eagle Scout project last year when he thought about doing something to benefit his old school.

Anders, who attended Conestoga Elementary from first through sixth grades, asked school officials for ideas for a project to benefit students, and they came up with idea of building a pergola behind the school.

After nearly a year of planning and design work, Anders, fellow members of Boy Scout Troop 146 and volunteers completed the massive wooden pergola, which stands over two benches near the school's community gardens, in mid-November.

"The finished project looks very nice, and I am incredibly happy with the result," said Anders, who is in his senior year at Penn Manor High School. "Seeing it up all in one piece really is amazing, especially after a year of planning."

Shortly after work began in October, Anders ran into a glitch when the crew wasn't able to dig a deep enough hole for one of the support footers. So they relocated the project to a more suitable site.

High school project in final stages of completion

New auxiliary gym, fitness center under construction

Phase 3 of the Penn Manor High School construction and renovation project is under way and is expected to be substantially completed by the time the 2022-2023 school year starts on August 29.

After completing the classroom portion of the project last summer, workers are now building a new auxiliary gym, weight room, fitness center and locker rooms next to the existing gym.

Work also will begin on a project to upgrade and modernize the high school's cafeteria and kitchen facilities.

In addition, workers will be dismantling and removing the temporary metal building that served as an ag shop and gymnasium.

The old library/administration offices will be converted into an area housing a technology suite, large-group instruction space and health/physical education

It's a new era for music, drama at the high school

Ranck Auditorium hosts first in-person plays, concerts

The new Ranck Auditorium at Penn Manor High School has been bustling with students and audience members enjoying live theatre and musical performances for the first time this year.

Students performed the fall play, *Clue*, and the spring musical, *Addams Family*, on the new stage, which also has hosted concerts, assemblies and awards programs throughout the year.

While slightly smaller than the old auditorium, with 916 seats, the new space is a vast improvement.

It includes roomy, comfortable cushioned seats; dedicated dressing rooms, instrument storage and costume

preparation areas; and a lobby area with tables, chairs and space for concessions.

The performance space features a built-in sound system with 14 wireless microphones, a digital LED lighting system that greatly reduces heat buildup and a new HVAC system to keep temperatures comfortable for performers and audience members alike.

A garage door provides backstage access, making it easier to move instruments and props on and off the

stage, which features new drapes and a large-scale projection screen.

The opening of the auditorium coincides with the 50th anniversary of musicals at Penn Manor High School, which presented its first – *Finian's Rainbow* – in 1972, the same year the school's thespian troupe was chartered.
