## Off and running

*New school year begins with new personnel*

Penn Manor schools opened their doors to more than 5,500 students for 2023-2024 with several key staff changes in place.

This year's opening on August 28 went smoothly, according to Penn Manor superintendent Dr. Phil Gale, who is beginning his second year as Penn Manor's top administrator.

"There is great excitement on the first day of school as the enthusiasm our staff and faculty have for our students shines through," he said. "We are eager for students to experience the challenges and

successes this new school year will bring."

Across the district, students were greeted by 33 new professional staff members for 2023-2024, including 29 new teachers. At Penn Manor High School, Doug Eby began his first year as principal, and Baron Jones took the helm at Marticville Middle School.

Other administrative changes for the new school year include Dee Galen as director of student support services, and Dan Forry as chief financial officer.

For the first time in years, students and staff did not

## Link Crew helps freshmen ease into high school life

A group of older students at Penn Manor High School is helping incoming freshmen acclimate to the high school environment through Link Crew.

The program matches 11th and 12th grade students with a group of 9th graders, whom they will mentor throughout the school year.

Students were recruited last

school year as Link Leaders and received training on the program, which emphasizes team building and working toward overcoming challenges and meeting shared goals.

One junior and one senior leader were assigned to groups of 10 incoming freshmen.

## Millersville University offers tuition-free classes

Millersville University and Penn Manor School District have implemented a new partnership that enables students to take college courses on MU's campus each semester of their junior and senior year at no cost.

Students who participate will learn about college life, interact closely with faculty and industry experts, and be mentored by MU college students while earning up to 12 college credits, tuition-free.

Upon successful completion of the courses, students will be automatically admitted to Millersville University. They also may transfer their



credits to another college or university.

To participate in the program, students must complete four business-related courses at Penn Manor. More information about the partnership is available from the high school counseling department.

# Penn Manor Ag teacher spends month in Uganda

*One of 10 from U.S. accepted into program to support agricultural education overseas*

Few teachers have gone as far to broaden their skills over the summer as Mary Wurzbach.

The Penn Manor High School agricultural education teacher ventured to Africa to spend a month immersed in the culture and classrooms of Uganda, both teaching with and learning from her colleagues.

Ms. Wurzbach was one of 10 teachers from across the United States accepted into the Teach Ag Uganda project, sponsored by the Fulbright-Hays Program, to support agricultural education research and training efforts overseas.

Teachers were in Uganda from July 6 to August 4, with the goal of increasing their understanding of global agriculture and food insecurity and learning about Ugandan culture

and teaching methods. Participants were paired with another American teacher and assigned to different schools in the country.

Language was not a barrier, as the students and staff spoke English.

The group started in the capital city of Kampala, traveled north to Sipi Falls and spent 18 days in Lira, where Ms. Wurzbach was assigned to St. Katherine Secondary School. She taught lessons on sustainable development goals, agriculture and entrepreneurship.

She also assisted with a project to raise 400 layer hens and taught alongside her Ugandan colleague about growing corn, or maize, which is grown on small farms in each village.

“The methods and techniques for growing

are completely different in Uganda,” she said. “When I asked students about the common pests they need to watch out for when growing maize, they responded, ‘Monkeys.’ I was not prepared for the answer!”

Another eye-opener was the layout of classrooms, which typically have 80 to 110 students who sit on

wooden benches and remain in the same room the entire day. The school day stretches from 7 a.m. to 4 p.m., with some labs held on weekends.

But what had the greatest impact was what she learned from her colleagues.

“Spending 30 days with amazing educators was the biggest highlight,” she said.

# HS again named to Best list

Ranking in county improves to No. 2

Penn Manor High School students and staff have again earned top honors from U.S. News & World Report.

The magazine's 2023 Best High Schools issue, released August 29, ranks Penn Manor High School No. 2 of the 18 high schools in Lancaster County included in the report. That's an improvement over last year's third-place ranking.

This is the ninth year in a row that Penn Manor High School has earned a ranking of sixth or higher in Lancaster County.

In addition, U.S. News ranked Penn Manor 71st of the 750 Pennsylvania high

schools evaluated in the report, an improvement over last year's ranking of 74th.

Overall, Penn Manor earned a score of 89.29 out of a possible 100 points,

for a national ranking of 1,893 among the 17,680 high schools in the report.

The 2023 rankings are based on graduation rates; students' math and reading proficiency and whether test

scores met expectations; the participation level and performance of students on advanced-placement tests; and the performance of "underserved" students.

"This is an example of the quality education the Penn Manor community provides for our students," said superintendent Dr. Phil Gale. "Congratulations to the students, high school faculty and staff for the work they do to help students define and achieve their academic and life goals."



# Hambricht named Watershed School of Excellence

## Teachers lauded for focus on 'student-centered learning,' studying local environment

Hambricht Elementary School has been named a 2023 Watershed School of Excellence by the Pennsylvania Association of Environmental Educators for its efforts to teach students about the impact of watersheds on the environment.

Fourth-grade teachers Bradley Showalter and Katherine Harnish accepted the award on behalf of Hambricht at a ceremony in March. Both teachers, along with Kelley Groff and Ay'Shia Gaston, completed watershed education training in 2021 under a partnership with Millersville University, Virginia Wesleyan University and Norfolk Collegiate School.

At Hambricht, teachers incorporate lessons about watersheds – land areas that channel rainfall and snowmelt to creeks, streams, rivers, and, eventually, to the ocean – in their classes.

Students learn how to identify a watershed and how water moves within these areas. They also study the Hambricht campus and use a computer simulation to determine how surface changes would improve the watershed. Students also have conducted studies of water quality and aquatic macroinvertebrates in the Little Conestoga Creek at Maple Grove and Charlestown Parks.

The Hambricht teachers were hailed by the PAEE as “passionate, determined, and innovative educators.”

Congratulations to Hambricht, and its dedicated teaching staff, on receiving this award.

# AP exam score is just perfect

*Suren Clark one of only 44 worldwide to achieve feat*

Penn Manor senior Suren Clark is one of only 44 students from across the globe to achieve a perfect score on the AP Microeconomics test, out of about 96,000 students who took the exam in May 2023.

Less than 0.05 percent of test takers earned a perfect score.

Suren “was shocked” to learn the results, he said. “The news was unbelievable, especially after hearing that I was only one of 44 students out of 96,000 worldwide to achieve this score. I immediately texted my parents that I had good news.”

Suren credits his AP economics teacher, Chris Meier, with helping prepare him for the rigorous test, which includes 60 multiple choice questions and three free-response questions that require test-takers

to explain economic concepts and principles, perform numerical analyses and create graphs or other visuals.

“Thanks to Mr. Meier, I walked into the testing center feeling confident, but not presumptuous about my readiness,” he said. “Leaving the test, overall, I felt good, but the thought of a perfect score was not in my mind whatsoever.”

After high school, Suren plans to major in economics and mathematics with a possible minor in political science or international studies before pursuing a law degree or a Ph.D.

He is the son of Sepideh Yalda and Richard Clark of Millersville.

# Students place third in nation in TSA debating

A team of two Penn Manor High School students recently took home a top award in the Technology Student Association (TSA) National Conference.

Jordan Chen and Suren Clark placed third in the Debating Technological Issues competition at the conference, besting competitors from across the United States.

During the conference, held June 28 to July 2 in Kentucky, teams had to research a topic relating to social media and society and prepare for a debate against students from other TSA chapters.

Teams had to take either a pro or con stance on the topic, submit a summary of research references, and use that research to support their position in a debate.

Jordan, a junior, and Suren, a senior, were assigned the topic “social media promotes collective ideas and strengthens groups.”

During the preliminary round, they had to debate in favor of that statement. In the final round, they had to debate in opposition to the statement.

They were judged on the quality of their debates.

# Commencement returns to traditional F&M site

## 400 in Class of 2023 earn their diplomas

About 400 students received their diplomas May 31 before an enthusiastic crowd as Penn Manor High School held commencement at Franklin & Marshall College for the first time in three years.

The graduation ceremony marked the end of a challenging four years for the Class of 2023, which lived through the disruptions brought on by a pandemic and a major construction project at their school.

“We still managed to push ourselves beyond our limits and embraced every opportunity for growth through academics, sports,

music, theater, and many other activities,” Abigail Ames, class president, told the crowd.

Fifty-seven seniors graduated with honors and a GPA of 4.0 or higher; 25 students earned a total of 100 college credits while at the high school; and 269 students took 412 Advanced Placement exams in 27 different subjects.

Sixteen graduates have signed letters of intent to play sports in college, and several students qualified for regional and state competitions in band, orchestra or chorus.

Two-third of the graduates plan to continue their studies, either at two-year or four-year

institutions, and six members of the Class of 2023 have chosen to enter the military.

One of them, Teagen Rodgers, began serving in February. When his mother, Danielle Rodgers, a Manor

Middle School counselor, walked across the stage to accept his diploma, the crowd burst into applause.

Also honored at the ceremony was Lauren Stoner, named Student of the Year.

## Two recent graduates earn highest FFA award

Recent Penn Manor graduates Madeleine Denlinger and Micah Frey have been honored with the American FFA Degree, the highest honor for an FFA member.

Maddy and Micah earned the honors as members of Manor FFA. Maddy graduated in 2019, and Micah graduated in 2020.

To qualify for an American Degree, members must earn at least \$10,000 through a supervised agricultural experience (SAE) or earn at least \$2,000 and work at least 2,250 hours outside of class time through their SAE. An SAE is a program in which FFA members own their own business, hold a professional position as an employee or conduct research.

Recipients must also complete 50 hours of community service and demonstrate outstanding leadership abilities and civic involvement.

Less than one percent of FFA members meet this criteria and earn the American FFA Degree each year.

Maddy has been involved in Manor FFA since 2016. She spent more than 3,000 hours working at S & A Kreider & Sons dairy farm. She has also completed 54 hours of community service.

Maddy is currently a sophomore at Penn State University majoring in food science.

Micah began his FFA involvement in 2018. His main SAE project was raising swine to show and sell at the Lampeter Fair every year. In 2022, he began another SAE project working at Frey Farms.

Micah spent 54 hours in community service projects and continues working for the family custom farming and hauling business.

## Penn Manor HS junior named Dairy Princess

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# NASA scientist inspires students at alma mater

*Jacob Bleacher, 1996 PM graduate, is a chief exploration scientist working on moon mission*

Jacob Bleacher, a chief exploration scientist with NASA, returned to his alma mater in May to talk with students about his career path after graduating from Penn Manor High School in 1996.

Bleacher encouraged students to take as many math courses as possible and to learn the value of collaboration in the workplace.

Collaboration is key in his role in NASA's Human Exploration and Operations Mission Directorate, which is working on human exploration of the Moon and Mars. Bleacher's research focuses on understanding the volcanic history of the Earth, Moon and Mars.

He was featured on "Good Morning America" September 27 to discuss NASA's planned Artemis 3



mission to the moon in 2025.

After graduating from Penn Manor, Bleacher studied astronomy at Franklin & Marshall College, but realized he had more interest in geology and switched his major. He encouraged students to be flexible in their career paths and to follow whatever field inspires them.

He pointed out that the work he now does at NASA did not even exist when Bleacher was at Penn Manor, so today's students will

likely end up in completely new fields in the future.

Whatever they do, they'll need to be able to communicate and work well with others, a skill Bleacher said he first developed even before college while working at a grocery store and as a landscaper.

"You can imagine that launching a rocket is not just one person's job. That's

not how it works. It's a huge, multidisciplinary, complicated thing that requires good relationship skills with other people," he said. "Collaborating means I'm good at this, you're good at that, and if we work together, we'll be good at the whole thing."
