

Chapter 339 Plan

Introductions

Melissa—State of the Union

Valerie Minnich—Teenhope Mental Wellness Screening for grades 7 and 9 to screen for depression, anxiety, suicidality. Presentation to students + 2 screening tools + follow-up meeting for each student. 187 students screened at HS, 30% showed up at-risk (higher than normal). 148 students screened at MS, 34% at-risk. Do students know who their school counselor is? 75% of HS students do. 15 HS students selected "other" as their gender identity.

Dr. Egan—SHAPE Assessment, thanked the 8 or so people who have worked on the committee. Helped us see what we do well and where our needs are.

Melissa—Takeaway 1: more needs for Tier 1 across the district. Takeaway 2: we have ample community resources, need to make sure we are sharing it visible and consistently on all district blogs and sites. Takeaway 3: School Counselor and School Social Worker ratios need to be reviewed.

Nickole Nafziger—asked about email blasts for community resources information.

Dr. Egan—Acknowledged that student well-being directly impacts academics. Possible use of covid funding to help ratios in our 10 buildings, specifically with the 4 buildings that currently share counselors.

Dr. Mike—thanked all members who guided our work on the Mental Health Task Force. Noted that it was helpful to find our strengths as a district and to identify needs to help make improvements moving forward.

Melissa—Talked about our .5 position from Community Services Group who is an "Outreach Specialist/Case Manager" for our M-Vento population. She is a master's level licensed social worker thow provides services and resources to our M-Vento families and tries to meet with the families at least biweekly.

Melissa—Staffing: heard from this advisory group that counseling ratios were of concern, especially at the elementary level. Thanked upper admin for being a part of these discussions.

Valerie Minnich—has noticed that the #1 thing young clients are discussing is their sleeping habits as they come of the pandemic. Students are finding it challenging to re-establish routines.

Gail Ulmer—Maria Vita does a workshop on sleep routines through Aveidum at the HS.

Jacob Marino—posed a question for Valerie about these sleep struggles being new or existing pre-covid? Both Jacob and Valerie see these struggles as increasing since the pandemic.

Valerie Minnich—pre-covid, percentages of at-risk MS and HS students hovered around 17-18%, now seeing percentages near 30-40%.

Sam Strosser—has noticed an increase in students sleeping in class, gaming all night.

Adam Brown—some of this was already increasing and getting worse societally pre-covid; covid has exacerbated this.

Kim Juba—attendance issues are exacerbated as well, post covid.

Dr. Mike—PMVS numbers are trending downward after a record year last year. In general, PMVS grades are lower than in-person grades. Our school avoiders are still choosing PMVS and their grades and mental health are showing gaps.

Melissa—huge number of SAIPs last year, getting better this year. Concerns over: failing grades, attendance, sleep habits, gaming addictions.

Lauren Hauck—wondering what percentage of our attendance issues were related to quarantining during the 20/21 school year? Melissa and Dr. Mike commented on the fact that those quarantines certainly played a part in absences.

Kate Black—runs a school and private practice within the district for mental health. Sees a maximum of 24 clients at a time, but has been getting at least 5 new referrals a week and she has to turn them away. Often they are calling her AFTER they've checked with TW Ponessa, Philhaven, etc.

Melissa—sometimes we are seeing more students as school counselors because they are not able to access services outside of school, despite their best efforts. Reminded everyone that TeamCare is our school-based provided/partner. Noted that some schools in the county may be employing their own in-house therapists.

Jenna Carlson—Do we see an increase in SAP referrals at MS and HS? Are we using SAP before other referrals or after other referrals have been made?

Danielle Rogers—Has had 10 SAP referrals in past week. Often does SAP first so at least the mentoring piece can help a student as they wait for other services to begin.

Melissa—will use SAP as she gets the students on waiting lists as other agencies. Also likes using SAP for drug and alcohol referrals because TeamCare doesn't always address those concerns right away.

Jenna Carlson—Do we have elementary SAP at Penn Manor?

Kim Juba—We do not have elementary SAP. We utilize our social worker, Joy Meley, as well as refer to Crisis Intervention as needed.

Melissa—reminded everyone of the "Warm Line" for when students or families are not in crisis but just need someone to talk to. Mental Health America also offers 3 free counseling sessions. Touchstone is a mental health copay assistance program, but the family would still need a primary insurance.

Valerie Minnich—Added that over or under eating is also a concern for students these days as they come out of pandemic mode.

Jacob Marino—Asked about Penn Manor's awareness of Instagram and Tik Tok shaming that students are doing to one another.

Danielle Rogers-students are making accounts to target teachers as well.

Gail Ulmer—ask Jacob if he is hearing any feedback from students who are upset about this social media shaming?

Hard to prove or address because the social media sites have their own rules for what can and can't be posted. Hard to find out who is running the accounts at any given time.

Nickole Nafziger—some kids create the lists out of hurt and anger / retaliation.

Jacob Marino—has broken up verbal arguments about what is being posted.

Gail Ulmer—trying to find ways to turn these challenges and social media posts into something more positive, such as fun Tik Tok challenges.

Melissa—provided a recap and thanked everyone for participating in the School Counseling Advisory Board this school year. Will be keeping in touch.

Lauren-

- focus on the elementary level , teach them to id emotions and deal with anger and anxiety ,
- invest early when they have the years in the same building, invest in more counselors, hire more counselors and social workers

Kate Black-

 need for consistency between buildings and from K-12. Cant really have different content, curriculum, skills taught at dif buildings. Consistency of skills and vocabulary, Continuity of Care is important and start in elem and watch things build upon the prior learning, have the district mental health plan actually coordinated, not piecemeal, spell it out what is done and interventions that are offered and who does them, have it consistent,

- Teaching /screening and building on resiliency skills is key for schools. Basic things -focus on resiliency- feelings, perspective taking, how to survive discomfort, how to handle discomfort, get used to change, discomfort,
- Consider have school employed therapists so you don't have to rely on only kids with insurance. This could be a counselor who is able to handle drop ins and have regular check ins.
- Have a restorative leader, who handles SEL lessons , some of this curriculum /lessons in classrooms, works with PE dept on Mental health units and leads restorative circles for students in conflict

Nicki

- Identify what works we have building blocks
- Partner with outside agencies
 - Who would coordinate the partnering with outside agencies- someone to coordinate mentoring, school based counseling etc

Kim Myer

- Focus on the family system, early intervention pre-K
- Screen/assess families and provide a way to track them/support them in a consistent continuity of care format for 12 years. (Parent Liasons, social workers...)
 - What does this look like, get to know the families, help them access services,
- Continuity of services, using same vocabulary from building to building-
- Hire more social workers,
- Employ therapists on staff in schools. Liscenced mh providers so insurance isn't an issue
- Build a program from a strength based approach not deficiencies-- screen to assess, develop levels of intervention and have a consistent continuity of care
- Focus on wellness- mindful, nutrition,
- Noted that there is a lack of staffing for MH in our buildings
- Look for examples of schools/ with effective models of social workers/therapists providing therapy

Comments:

- Staffing, limited by numbers, any amount of more staff will provide more capacity.
- We are understaffed so even hiring a few extras will not bring us to a level of being proactive. Not able to meet needs with current staffing.
- Consider Counseling aide-- associates or bachelors level psych /social work /education major who can help parents fill out forms, screen students as they walk in and provide basic services , parent liaisons

- We currently have 60 kids getting individual therapy at PM. A typical full time school based therapis has 50-60 kids. A typical clinical cousnelor has 45 kids.
- Figure out how to use after hours -- ASI for restorative, therapy, provide bussing
- Have an in house person to do triage -- a triage secretary/Counseling Aide
- Have a restorative /counseling center where someone focuses on conflict/crisis so we can meet the students where they are, don't need to be a masters level counselor to do little check ins, tlc. Have bach level provide some of these services
- Focus on building relationships, is there someone available when the kid needs it?
- Develop a mentoring program K-12/Peer Mentors/Outside mentors -- need someone to coordinate that, focus on building opportunities for connections to be built with kids
