Suydam most recently was the assistant principal at Central through Manor since 2020. She previously served as acting dean of



All schools included in 'Best Schools' rankings



Congratulations to the staff and students throughout the district, as all schools received "Best Schools" honors from the U.S. News & World Report in the latest school rankings.

Our schools placed within the top 20 percent of all Pennsylvania schools, based on academic measures.

Out of 3,208 elementary schools in the state evaluated for the report, LeTort was ranked 109th. Pequea Elementary was ranked 290th, followed by Central Manor (300th), Conestoga (305th), Eshleman (331st), Hambright (451st) and Martic (624th).

In the middle school rankings, Marticville was ranked 71st out of 2,384

Pennsylvania middle schools. Manor was ranked 116th.

U.S. News ranks the schools based on students' math and reading proficiency and each school's socioeconomiC demographics. Any school scoring in the top 40 percent is considered "high achieving."

"I am very proud of the work our teachers, support staff, and students put forth each day," said Superintendent Dr. Gale. "The recognition demonstrates what happens in our schools each day."

Earlier in the fall, U.S. News & World Report released their high school rankings.

Three PM graduates earn American FFA Degrees

Recent Penn Manor graduates Vita Failla, Molly Gehr, and Carly Railing were notified that they are recipients of the American FFA Degree, which is the highest honor for a member of the FFA.

To qualify for an American Degree, members must earn at least \$10,000 through a supervised agricultural experience (SAE) or earn at least \$2,000 and work at least 2,250 hours outside of class time through their SAE. An SAE is a program in which FFA members own their own business, hold a professional

position as an employee, or conduct research.

Degree recipients must also complete at least 50 hours of community service with at least three different activities. Less than one percent of FFA members qualify and earn the American FFA Degree each year.

Vita is a 2024 graduate of Penn Manor and has been involved in Manor FFA since 2019. She raised market goats for six years and

market hogs for two years through Manor FFA.

She has dedicated over 2,000 hours working at Kneisley Family Farms picking pumpkins, packing eggs in a commercial layer house at Coffee Street Acres, and working on her grandparents property, LeTort Valley Farms, in the broiler breeder chicken house managing a flock of 19,000 birds.

Vita made approximately \$28,000 from her projects and had \$9,000 invested into her livestock projects.

Vita is currently a sophomore at Penn State York majoring in agribusiness management. She hopes to own her own agritourism farm in the future and carry on her Paw Paw's legacy of working in the farming industry.

Since retiring from showing livestock, she has been raising ducks and growing speciality fall crops. Vita plans to continue to help her younger sister with goat showmanship through 4-H in the coming years.

Molly graduated from Penn Manor in 2024 and was the Chapter Reporter in 2023. She will be in attendance at the National FFA Convention & Expo to receive her honorary degree.

Gehr raised market sheep to show at a local fair and worked at Riverside Blooms, a local flower farm, earning approximately \$21,080 throughout her time in Manor FFA. Her SAE's involved approximately 600 hours of outside class work.

She completed over 105 hours of community service, including a mission trip to Kentucky and West Virginia with her church. She also volunteered at the Tomato Festival, a craft camp, the food pantry and Blessings of Hope.

She is currently pursuing a post-secondary degree at

Delaware Valley University as an animal science major, specializing in livestock production and management. She hopes to start her own breeding business with sheep and cattle.

Carly is a 2024 Penn Manor graduate and was an officer for two years as a member of Manor FFA. She attributes the officer positions with challenging her and helping to build her confidence in areas like public speaking

She began working on a dairy farm the summer after her freshman year. She was responsible for milking over 400 cows and occasionally feeding the calves. Her SAE experience at the dairy farm gave her knowledge about animal science and farming. Railing also raised pigs for the Lampeter Fair for three years and lambs for a year.

She was an active member in Manor FFA, volunteering at community events and serving with her youth group. Carly attended several missions trips through her youth group and served at Water Street Mission with the Manor FFA officer team.

Carly participated in two Career Development Events (CDEs), poultry evaluation and floriculture. The CDEs provided the opportunity to try different types of careers.

Railing is in the nursing program at Harrisburg Area Community College and hopes to become a licensed RN.

Message from the superintendent

Make It Happen — Three basic words that themselves don't mean much, but together become a call to action. They have become our district theme for the 2025-26 school year. From day one teachers, administrators, support staff, and students were encouraged to Make It Happen.

The call to action is happening. Students and teachers identified areas that they want to improve. They have focused on a goal. They are being more intentional with what they are working on or how they are spending their time in the classroom and during co-curricular activities. Our *Make It Happen* theme drives three key iniatives across the district.

1. Student Attendance - We know students need to be in school. We also know that there are many factors, some out of their control, that keep some students from attending. To fulfill our curricular goals, a student returning from being absent has the dual challenge of catching up on what was missed while keeping pace with the current lessons. For these reasons, we are focused on improving student attendance.

2. Greater Community Connections - Our mission statement states. "The Penn Manor community will work collaboratively to help students define and achieve their academic and life goals" The school district provides the academic needs of our community. In order to do this we need to partner with students, parents, community members, businesses, organizations. We want to build better relationships with our community.

3. Consistency - We are

a big school district. Penn Manor is comprised of seven elementary schools, two middle schools, a large comprehensive high school, 113 square miles, (both urban and rural areas), and close to 400 teachers and 300 supporting staff. We strive for students to have similar academic and curricular

> experiences while balancing teacher autonomy to address individual student needs and talents.

As I shared these focus areas with staff, I did have a brief moment of panic, "How are we going to do this?" After all, these are difficult

things that many school districts struggle to do.

But other school districts

don't have the resources that are unique to Penn Manor our community. We receive great support from our parents and the community and our ability to do what we do is enhanced by this support. The Penn Manor community has always been very supportive of our students. Two key organizations, our Parent Teacher Organizations (PTOs) and the Penn Manor Education Foundation (PMEF) make significant contributions to the district. In the first few months of the 2025-26 school year, the PTOs and PMEF have fundraised and provided thousands of dollars for our classrooms and students. I recognize that the work of the PTOs and PMEF comes from people who Make It Happen. Thank you for your generous support.

As a district, we will continue to help students develop academic and social skills. This year we are focused to *Make It Happen*.

Penn Manor's spring 2025 athletic teams concluded another notable sports season. Boys' lacrosse had a historic playoff run, the softball team celebrated their championship title, and multiple Track and Field athletes earned medals at the state level.

Boys' lacrosse ended their historic season with a 13-6 record and finished second in the Section I LL League standings. The team advanced to the District III semifinals and qualified for the PIAA State Championships for the first time in program history.

Grant Bradburn, Jack Warfel, Kyle Schmidtke, and Joe Hull were named First Team Section I All Stars. Bradburn contributed to the team's record-setting season, by becoming the program's all-time leading scorer and a recipient of All-American honors.

Girls' lacrosse finished their season with a 14-7 record and headed to the District III quarterfinals, following a loss in the LL League playoffs. The team finished third in the section I LL League standings.


