Aliza was nominated by Elizabeth Raff, Penn Manor School District K-12 Learning Facilitator. The Pennsylvania Department of Education announced which Finalists would continue on in the competition during Teacher Appreciation Week, May 4 through 8.

Aliza studied education at Messiah University where she received a middle level education certification in social studies and science. She

earned her master's degree from Millersville University in Curriculum Design, Instruction, and Assessment, with a STEM certification.

Following graduation, she became a long-term substitute at Eshleman. In 2017, she joined the Eshleman staff full-time as a fifth-grade teacher following a stint at Central Manor Elementary.

Although she did not always envision herself becoming a teacher, she chose education because it allowed her to remain a lifelong learner, alongside her students.

Her favorite thing about teaching is having a good rapport with her students. She thrives on meeting her students where they are and what accommodations they need to succeed in the classroom.

Franklin Myers, Pat Kline, Andrew Dumm, Luke Schoenfelder, and Donovan Hoffer were nominated by the Penn Manor community based on their professional accomplishments, leadership, and local impact.

Myers (Class of 1953) was class treasurer and is a fifth-generation farmer. He earned his

bachelor's degree in Agronomy from Penn State University and master's degree from the University of Florida.

His early adoption of terracing techniques significantly reduced runoff into the Chesapeake Bay, making him a leader in sustainable agriculture. He has been a dedicated member of the Willow Street Lions Club and earned the "Lion of the Year"

award for his service. His commitment to his neighbors is further reflected in his years on the Pequea Township Planning Commission and leadership within the Willow Street UCC.

Kline (Class of 1982) was inspired by his parents' values of integrity and service, and his teachers mentoring him to love learning. Pat built a successful career by working on Wall Street with IBM following his graduation from Penn State University.

For 32 years, he was a State Farm agent in Southern Lancaster County. A former Penn Manor School Board Director and current Penn Manor Education Foundation board member.

Pat resides in the area with his wife, Laura ('84) and has two children Erik ('10) and Cassie ('15) who also graduated from Penn Manor.

Dumm (Class of 2001) was valedictorian of his class at Penn Manor. He attended the United States Naval Academy in Annapolis, Maryland, where he majored in Systems Engineering with a minor in Computer and Robotics Engineering. After graduating with Honors, he was selected to become a Navy pilot.

In the Navy, he flew the venerable C-2A Greyhound, delivering critical logistics and personnel to aircraft carriers deployed around the world. Following multiple combat deployments in the Western Pacific and Middle East Theaters, and being stationed in Japan for two and a half years, he was selected to lead the only remaining Fleet Logistics Support Squadron, VRC-40 in Norfolk, Virginia.

After accumulating over 3,000 hours of flight time and hundreds of carrier-arrested landings, he retired from active-duty military service in 2025.

Andrew resides in Swedesboro, New Jersey with his wife Jessica ('03) and their three children. He currently

works for United Airlines and flies the 737 out of Newark, New Jersey.

Schoenfelder's (Class of 2007) work spans artificial intelligence, national security, consumer hardware, and philanthropy.

While at Georgetown University, he built a prototype low-cost sustainable home from earthbags behind his family's farm that he deployed to Haiti after the 2010 earthquake.

In 2013, he co-founded Latch, a building-access and smart-home technology company. Luke also co-founded a company working at the intersection of AI and national security.

Luke and his wife Rachel spend time primarily between Miami and Europe managing their businesses.

Hoffer (Class of 2009) was heavily involved in Manor Singers, chorus, and all theatre productions while at Penn Manor.

He studied at The American Musical and Dramatic Academy and returned home to perform at a number of local theatres and assist in the choreography for three musicals at Penn Manor.

He performed in Playlist Productions on board the Carnival Conquest and sang in the 40-person choir of Broadway's *Rocktopia*. Donovan lived in Chicago where he performed in *Rock of Ages*, *Full Monty*, and *Cats*.

Most notably, Donovan auditioned for NBC's America's Got Talent and received a 'yes' from all of the judges.

He currently resides in Miami, Florida where he is rehearsing for the Celebrity Cruise line's newest ship, Xcel, where he will perform in immersive concert shows on board.

- Traumatic brain injury
- Hearing impairment
- Specific learning disability
- Intellectual disability
- Multiple disabilities
- Other health impairment
- Orthopedic impairment
- Visual impairment, including blindness
- Speech and language impairment

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Ed Foundation awards \$68,000 in teacher grants

Projects enhance learning at all levels at all Penn Manor schools

Thanks to the Penn Manor Education Foundation, Penn Manor students are benefiting from more than \$68,000 in funding to enhance educational experiences at all levels across the district.

The Foundation awarded Venture Grants totaling more than \$72,000 in fall 2025 and over \$68,000 in spring 2026.

The grants have enabled students to participate in educational field trips to the North Museum of Nature and Science,

the New York City Garment District, Hispanic Flamenco Ballet, Baseball in Education at the Lancaster Stormers, and the Ware Center for the Arts.

Other grants funded a Mobile Music Recording Studio for the middle schools, a new Operant Chamber for the AP Psychology students, a treadmill for use during after school Weight Room at the middle school, and new chess boards to support the middle school and elementary chess clubs.

Several grants involved collaboration between departments and grade levels, one of the goals of the program.

Funding was also used for equipment for guitar students and admission and travel fees for high school students to attend the Model U.N. conferences.

Students in the drawing class received a digital camera to enhance their observational skills and document their artistic growth through professional year-end portfolios.
